I had an urging desire to get up in the hills to pick one last bucket or two of Huckleberries, but there was one project that did override the last trip to pick berries.

Getting up early, I jumped into that project of fixing the awning on my trailer and after hastily putting my tools away at 1:30 I was compelled to head for the berry fields in the hills, over 60 miles from my house.
